

## A Story to Remember

I was shopping one day in late December, when a young mother came up to me. "Are you the Bucket Lady?" she asked. "Yes, I am," I replied.

She then told me that at the beginning of the school year her son attended one of our Bucketfilling assemblies and asked if I had a few minutes to hear a wonderful story.

"Of course, I love wonderful stories," I said.

I was totally unprepared for what she was about to tell me.

On assembly day her son, Zachary, who is in the third grade, came home from school and told her all about bucket filling. He said that he had taken a pledge to fill a bucket every day by doing something nice for someone and asked her what he could do.

Zachary was excited about this bucket filling opportunity and over the following weeks he never failed to deliver his neighbor's newspaper and mail.

Thanksgiving Day arrived and their neighbor, now recovered from his surgery, walked over to Zachary's house. He asked if he was disturbing the family's dinner. They assured him that he was not and welcomed him into their family room. Introducing himself to the group gathered for the holiday, he told them that his Thanksgiving would not be complete without personally thanking Zachary for bringing his newspaper and mail to him every day while he recovered from surgery.

He explained how much the "Hope you are feeling better" notes, Zachary sometimes wrote, meant to him. He shook Zachary's hand and thanked him once more for remembering him every day.

Zachary told him that it was no trouble at all and reached up and gave his neighbor a hug.

The neighbor then turned to Zachary's mother and handed her an envelope containing a \$1,000 check for her son's college fund.

We both had tears in our eyes as she finished her story.
